Lent begins with ashes.

It begins with a black cross on our foreheads and the words, "Remember that you are dust, and to dust you will return." Every year, Lent reminds me that I will die.

At 30 years old, I am remarkably resilient to these meditations. I have often worn the ashes on my brow, but I'm not sure that their meaning has ever penetrated my skull. We young people have an impressive talent for denying the obvious, and believing in our own invincibility.

I will die. I am mortal. My life is fragile. I am but dust and ashes.

I will keep on saying those words to myself as the forty days of Lent pass. I will seek again and again to understand what it means to be vulnerable, to remember that one day I will die. I suspect that such meditations gain gravity with years. A true knowledge of mortality probably doesn't completely sink in until you've watched friends pass away, one by one, like the changing of the seasons.

My days are numbered, and that number keeps getting smaller. Every day, I have fewer and fewer moments to enjoy this good Earth. So what will I do with this knowledge? What will I do with my next 40 days? Will I seek to savor all the delicacies I can find? Will I embrace hedonism and search out new joys and new experiences? Will I make the most of the limited time I have left? Strangely, that is not what Lent is about.

Lent is about sacrifice. Lent is about denial.

Over the 40 days between Ash Wednesday and Easter, Christians everywhere will both contemplate their own deaths and actively seek to deny themselves the pleasures of life. Why is this? How can this be true? What prisoner on death row worries about his cholesterol?

The truth is that Lent isn't just about death. It may begin with ashes, but it ends in glory. We may spend Ash Wednesday contemplating the shortness of our lives, but Easter signals the beginning of eternity. My days are few, but I will not spend them chasing after the fleeting pleasures of this world. Heaven is waiting for me. I will not risk the health of my immortal soul to satiate my mortal gut.

Lent is what we do when we truly believe in eternity. We fast. We sacrifice. We take time to get right with God, because our days are numbered. Our time is running short. I will not wait till tomorrow because I am mortal. My life is fragile. I am but dust and ashes - but Easter is coming.

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Meet the Members MTM

It was a spring like day in the middle of February as we traveled to 17914 Timber Avenue just north of Glidden to meet Harry and Judy Reever. Born at St. Anthony Hospital in Carroll they both have lived in Glidden their entire lives. They began their school days together but were members of the first class in Glidden to be split into two sections. They believe the class might have been divided alphabetically as Judy Conner was in one section and Harry Reever was in another section.

Once they finished high school they were married and settled into a life of farming. Harry began farming with his father and they lived on the south place, presently where their son, Tim and Lora Reever live. In 1964, three years into their marriage the Reever's moved to a farm north of Glidden where they presently reside. In 1981 they built a new home at this location and moved into this home in 1982.

A near crises was averted in 2009 when a propane explosion rocked their home. Harry and Judy were home at the time and both were in a remote location when this occurred. It was determined that a copper gas line inside of the fire place had sprung a leak and the gas was contained within the fire place therefore the Reever's never smelled the leaking gas. Following the explosion, the Reever's lived in a borrowed camper and were able to spend some time in their home as it was being repaired. The repair work took 14 weeks to complete.

Judy's immediate family consisted of two sisters and one brother while Harry has one brother. Their extended family was large with many aunts and uncles. These people along with their parents had a big influence on their lives. Also, as many of us will agree, special teachers influence us for the rest of our lives. Joe Weed, agriculture instructor at Glidden was a person of influence in Harry's life as well as other boys from Glidden.

Harry and Judy are the proud parents of two children. They are Traci and her husband Mike Schaefer, Tim Reever and his wife Lora. Additionally they have five

grandchildren and enjoy following these children and support them in their activities.

When pressed to reveal a unique experience Harry reluctantly told the story about an airplane ride. It seems that three farmers were going to inspect some property and they were flying in a small private plane. The altimeter malfunctioned and recorded a height greater than the plane was actually flying as they descended to land. Because of this malfunction, the landing gear clipped the top of a barn in the flight pattern and it tore off the landing gear. They belied the plane in for a landing and walked away safe and sound. A very big blessing for all concerned.

The Reever's have been and are very active in the community. Harry has served on many boards of directors

such as the Fair Board, Extension Council, Insurance Board and other business boards. Judy has been a 4-H leader, a piano teacher for over forty years, volunteers at G-R in the peak up program and many other activities that are connected with being a farmer's wife.

Hobbies for the Reever family are very diverse. Like all good grandparents they follow the grandchildren involved in sports, school activities, the Opera at Simpson College, 4-H

activities, etc. They have enjoyed traveling throughout their lives whether it be to their cabin in Cross Lake, Minnesota, a trip to warm weather in Arizona or a trip to foreign lands such as Argentina, New Zealand or Australia. Judy involves some of her spare time with gardening and crocheting. Harry likes to fish, ride his motorcycle and both enjoy playing cards with family and friends.

Harry and Judy are very involved with the Presbyterian Church in that both have served as Deacons and Harry has served several times as a ruling Elder. Judy has been a lifelong member while Harry has been a member for over fifty years. They have taught Sunday school and Judy has been the church pianist for many years. The church is proud and indebted to the Reever's for all the years of service to First Presbyterian and we wish them well as they move into the future of tomorrows.
