There are few stories as enduring as Charles Dicken's classic, A Christmas Carol. It is a story that has been retold many times over and is a story that is still relevant today. Ebenezer Scrooge is an old miser who works his employees near to death and has no pleasure in his own life. On Christmas Eve, he is visited first by the ghost of his old partner, Jacob Marley, then by three successive ghosts of Christmas – past, present, and future.

My favorite scene from the story comes from Scrooge's encounter with Marley's ghost. As the old man is dozing in his chair, he begins to hear the sound of chains scraping along the ground. The sound gets closer and closer, but Scrooge ignores the ghastly noises with a characteristic, "humbug." Fear and reason battle for dominance in Scrooge's mind until suddenly, the cellar doors fly open and Marley emerges into sight. Wrapped around the ghost is an extremely long chain – but this is not any normal chain. This chain is made of "cash-boxes, keys, padlocks, ledgers, deeds, and heavy purses wrought in steel."

Scrooge is confused by this strange chain, made up of various financial instruments, and so he asks the ghost where it came from. Marley explains, "I wear the chain I forged in life. I made it link by link, and yard by yard; I girded it on of my own free will, and of my own free will I wore it." The chain obviously symbolizes everything Marley loved in life. His own obsession with wealth weighed him down and trapped him.

Marley's chain is a beautiful metaphor, but it is one that I fear we often misread. We hear Marley's warning of Scrooge's fate without realizing that Scrooge does not need to be warned. We assume that Scrooge still has time to escape his chain – the judgment for a selfish life – but the truth is that Scrooge already wears his chain. Marley says that he can see it plain as day.

This fact explains Ebenezer Scrooge's miserable and lonely life. He is unhappy at the start of the story. He is punished long before his eventual death. He already wears his chain. He has already entered into his punishment. And so have we. Every time we make a Scrooge-like decision in our lives, we are weighed down by it. Every selfish action, every unkind word, separates us from those who love us. We choose every day, either to push other people away or to welcome them into our lives.

Heaven and Hell are more than places to which souls must travel, they are states of being that we choose to live in. A soul destined for Hell already has one foot in it while still living. And similarly, a future resident of Heaven will continually bring Heaven with them everywhere they go. Are you worried about Heaven and Hell? Look at your life. In which do you choose to live? Have you forged for yourself a chain of selfish decisions or do you wear a crown of generosity and love?

The first lesson of Dicken's Christmas Carol was that we should not need supernatural intervention to show us our fate. The ghosts never told Scrooge anything he couldn't have easily learned on his own. And when Ebenezer Scrooge honestly examined the course of his own life, he chose to be more like the one we celebrate at Christmas.

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Meet the Members MTM

Sarah grew up in the Carroll area and attended Kuemper grade school through 6th grade. She finished high school at Carroll High. Upon graduation she attended college at Kirkwood in Cedar Rapids for one year and transferred to Capri College in Cedar Rapids. After 18 months she received her degree in cosmology.

Jeremy attended school at Carroll through middle school, while his father worked with the Conservation Service. Entering high school, Jeremy moved to Glidden with his family and graduated at Glidden-Ralston school. Jeremy's education was not complete as he also attended college at Kirkwood. After Kirkwood, Jeremy worked for a private environmental conservation group that contracted for work at Red Rock and Saylorville Lake. This is not the end of college for these two people but we will pick this up later.

Sarah is the daughter of Jerry Siedl and Donna Pemble. Both parents now live in Carroll, Iowa. Sarah had one brother and one sister who both live in the Carroll area. Jeremy is the son of Annette and the late Kent Douglas. Annette lives in Glidden and works in the dietary department at St. Anthony Hospital and Nursing Home. Jeremy's sibling, Michael, works at Pella Corporation and just signed up for another six year stint in the U. S. Army. Michael is awaiting his second deployment to Afghanistan. Jeremy and Sarah met at a party during winter break in January of 2000. They began dating on July 12, 2001.

It seems that this couple was very methodical in their decision making as they dated for eight years prior to the marriage at Holy Angles Church in Roselle, Iowa. Jeremy points out that Sarah agreed to purchase their home in Glidden, did all the paper work, secured the loan and signed the papers. Jeremy was often traveling due to his job in construction at the time.

To this marriage on May 9, 2009 were born two precious children. Jayden is four years old and attends pre-school. Madison, his sister is two years old and will attend a private pre-school next year.

Like many young people who graduate from high school these two were undecided as to what they wanted to do in life. After graduating from Capri and working at Great Clips for a couple of years, Sarah decided to change careers. She now works at St. Anthony Nursing home for the past 7 ½ years as a full-time employee until recently when she changed to part-time. She then enrolled in DMACC for nursing. She has earned a couple of scholarships and will graduate in May of 2017.

In January of 2016 Jeremy will begin an on-line course of study with Waldorf College, which will require two years of study. He will continue his full-time employment at West Central and he too earned a nice scholarship from West Central. He plans to graduate in 2018 with a degree in Occupational Safety and Health. Previous employment of Jeremy includes: Rotert Construction, Agri Associates and some conservation work.

Jeremy has been involved with the Water Rescue Volunteers for the past 16 years. He also trains new volunteers to help them get started. Jeremy explained that all recoveries are rather tough but his first recovery, with family standing close by, still wakes him up some nights. This community and surrounding communities are so grateful for the seven people like Jeremy that volunteer to perform such an important task.

Jeremy's other community activities include being a volunteer fireman and being a field instructor for the State Fire Marshall. This involves conducting training for fire departments throughout the State.

All work and no play makes Sarah and Jeremy a dull couple. To avoid this, the two are involved in golf, gardening, hunting, fishing, scuba diving, and traveling. They have traveled to Cozumel, Mexico, Aruba, Honduras and other areas in the United States.



We asked about memories of their church experience and they had many. Jeremy's father, Kent, passed away in June of 2009 and the couple was very appreciative of Pastor Fitzsimmons, and the congregation for all the support they received during this troubled time. Memories include baptism of their children, lighting candles with Patrick Littlefield, their marriage ceremony, helping serve rainbow sherbet at the Mother-Daughter Banquet as a young boy, attending church with grandparents, and being around good people.

Some of the best advice they received from parents include, "You can't screw anything up if you don't do anything" and "With age comes wisdom". This young couple are gaining wisdom as they live their lives, attend more college classes and raise their children.

It was a real joy spending time with Jeremy, Sarah, Jayden and Madison and we left wishing them well as they develop their family and their lives while enjoying this Christmas season.

A Report from Presbytery

As many of you know, Pastor Brian has been elected to serve as the Moderator of our local Presbytery. A few times a year, Presbyterian elders and pastors from Western Iowa get together to worship together, conduct church business, and create fellowship between local Presbyterian churches. It is the job of the moderator to ensure that these meetings function decently and in good order, ensuring that people's concerns are recognized and conflicts settled in an orderly way.

Unfortunately, in recent years several churches in our area have chosen to leave our denomination, the Presbyterian Church (USA). This has resulted in a budget crunch for our local Presbytery. We have the same expenses that we used to have, but fewer churches are helping to support the local Presbytery. No one wants to attempt to squeeze even more and more fund from the remaining churches, so we recently voted to reorganize the Presbytery to cut expenses.

We, therefore, decided to share our Presbytery Administrator with North Central Presbytery, and we also voted to eliminate the position of Mission Coordinator. The responsibilities of the Mission Coordinator were then handed over to the Moderator Team.

These changes enabled the Presbytery to temporarily balance their budgets, and we are currently looking into the possibilities of merging with other Presbyteries in Iowa to produce a long-term solution to our financial woes.

But what does this have to do with us?

Good question. As Moderator of the Presbytery, Pastor Brian will be called upon to help manage this transition. And, as a member of the Moderator Team, he will help to fulfill the former responsibilities of the Mission Coordinator (Coordinating missional activities within the Presbytery). The goal of his efforts will be to change the focus of Presbytery meetings from conducting the business of the Presbytery to working together to better serve God in our communities.

Hopefully, this change will result in better partnerships with other Presbyterian congregations. For example, in March our Presbytery meeting will be at the Carroll Presbyterian Church and commissioners from each church will bring a small donation to support the Domestic and Sexual Assault Outreach Center, working out of the Carroll Presbyterian Church (they always appreciate a donation of diapers). Then, at the meeting, we will do our best to pair churches who are working on similar projects with each other. So, churches who want to work on issues of food security could strategize together how best to meet the needs of their respective communities.

The goal is simply to help churches in the Presbytery work together in more effective ways – not simply conducting business. From now on, Presbytery meetings will have less arguing and more cooperation to advance the Kingdom of Heaven.

If you are interested in Presbytery, ask Pastor Brian about our meetings, and hopefully soon we'll find ways to work more closely with our fellow Presbyterians.
