“The Rose Parade will never happen on a Sunday and, in return, God will never let it rain on the Rose Parade.”

I repeated those words to myself as I stood guarding a parking lot in Pasadena, CA, on January 2nd, 2006. The Rose Parade was a block away, it was a Monday, and it was raining. But it wasn't just raining – it was flooding. I was drenched, the library was filling with water, and I couldn't go inside because some confused Big-12 fans might block our parking lot. I was miserable.

And those bitter words stuck with me: “The Rose Parade will never happen on a Sunday and, in return, God will never let it rain on the Rose Parade.”

Despite their deal with God, it still rained on the Rose Parade. And the worst part of that weekend was that on January 1st of that year Pasadena saw perfectly clear skies. If they had not rescheduled to avoid a Sunday parade, then I would not have been caught in the rain.

Our deals with God don't always work out the way we first planned. This becomes obvious when we think of the life of Jesus Christ. He fulfilled dozens of prophecies about his life – but no one expected him to live like he did. They expected a divine king to exercise political power, but he changed the world through his moral example. They thought that he would fight off the Romans, but he told people that the Romans weren't the true enemy. The agreement that the Ancient Jews thought they had with God didn't turn out they way they planned.

And we are often similarly overconfident. Thousands of preachers cite Biblical prophecy to promise national renewal or financial blessing. We think that we can use God's promises to get him to do what we want him to. But that is not how faith works.

Faith is the act of submission to God's will, it is not a negotiation. We agree to follow his ways because – like a good parent – God knows best. We do not follow his law because it is the route to getting the earthly blessings we want. God sees the world as it really works. God understands what is truly important, and God is already looking out for the deepest needs of his people. As Christians, we trust that God will care for us; we don't cut deals expecting more.

The New Year is a time when many of us reexamine our lives. We make resolutions and set goals for the future. This is a good thing to do, but we are often tempted to bargain God into helping us. This is unnecessary. God loves us and wants to see us thrive. If we set goals that are in line with God's hopes for our lives, then we can expect his daily aid. But if we set goals that are opposed to God's wishes for us, then no amount of bargaining will change his mind.

We don't need to plead for God's blessings. God wants to bless us. But we must recognize that many of the things that we see as blessings are actually burdens in God's eyes.

Sometimes it does rain on the Rose Parade, because sometimes Los Angeles needs the rain.

Meet the Congregation

On a cold, snowy winter night, we had the joy of sitting with Sandy Draves Pietig and Russ Pietig for a delightful conversation. Sandy is the daughter of Russ and Lillian Draves and Russ is the son of the late Marvin and Annabell Pietig. Marvin died in 2012 and Annabell died in 2015.

Sandy has two siblings, Kim Draves and wife Geri and sister Becky and her husband Scott Dillehay. Russ was joined in his family with four siblings. They are Dennis Pietig and his wife Chris, Gary Pietig, deceased, Joyce Mieners and husband Don and Donna Krickle and husband Paul. This couple has four grandchildren with another grandchild on the way. Sandy claims three children, Alyssa and husband Matt Willenborg, Bryant and wife Megan and Chad. Russ has four children Becky, Melissa, Lindsey and Nicole. This extended family relates very well to each other as they support one another in life's journey.

Both Sandy and Russ were born at St. Anthony Hospital in Carroll and both were the youngest children in their families. Sandy and Russ attended school in Carroll, Iowa. Russ graduated from Kuemper High School and Sandy from Carroll High. Russ graduated in 1982 while Sandy followed graduating in 1984. Vacation trips have been abundant for Russ and Sandy, as they have visited Mt. Rushmore, Las Vegas, Branson, Missouri and Washington, D.C. The visit to Washington, D.C. was very educational and historical for them.

In addition to trips, they enjoy camping with their fifth wheel camper. They laugh when they explain their camping trip to Swan Lake. Swan Lake is only one-half mile north of their home place. They also like to camp at Lake View and at stock car events, wherever they are located. Russ is into stock car races and can speak the language of race car drivers. His favorite car driver is Dale Earnhart, Jr. who drives car #88. They attend races in Kansas City and Newton, Iowa on a yearly basis.

The best advice this couple received was not presented in words but was demonstrated by parents and family. That advice is the reward in life of hard work, demonstrated each day as they grew in their youth and applied each day as they move through life.

Annual Meeting - 2017

The church's annual meeting will be held on January 29th, following church and a lunch. Many times the annual meeting is viewed as a ho-hum occasion. But, let controversy enter the church and people who have been sitting on the side-lines say, "Why didn't someone do something?". The annual meeting is a chance for people to ask questions, express their thoughts and keep bad things from happening. Attendance, participation and supporting the church are important as you vote for leadership in First Presbyterian and by your attendance, you are supporting the beliefs of the Presbyterian Church (USA).

So what does this church believe? In the early 20th Century, Presbyterians drafted the Six Great Ends of the Church.

1. The proclamation of the gospel for the salvation of humankind
2. The shelter, nurture and spiritual fellowship of the children of God
3. The maintenance of divine worship
4. The preservation of the truth
5. The promotion of social righteousness
6. The exhibition of the Kingdom of Heaven to the world

John Knox was the founder of the theological foundation of the Presbyterian Church which adopted a rather strict philosophy. Over the years this strict Philosophy has been changed to include a broader segment of the population. The Church is committed to ecumenism to demonstrate this open attitude.

The young man explained. 'My grandmother once told me this story, and from that time on I have always tried to pass along its message to those I love and those who are in need of encouragement. In all my years of attending socials and dinners, I always remember that when the dishes of the main course were being cleared, someone would inevitably lean over and say, 'Keep your fork.' It was my favorite part because I knew that something better was coming like velvety chocolate cake or deep-dish apple pie. Something wonderful, and with substance!' So, I just want people to see me there in that casket with a fork in my hand and I want them to wonder 'What's with the fork?'

Then I want you to tell them: 'Keep your fork ... the best is yet to come.'
