

# First Presbyterian Church of Glidden

August 2017



Iowans feed the world. The state of Iowa produces more corn, soybeans, pork, and eggs than any other state. Every year, Iowa produces three times as much corn as Mexico and nearly double that of Minnesota (the second largest corn producing state). Where do most Americans get their daily calories from? A farm in Iowa.

But this is only the tip of the iceberg. The United States, and especially Iowa, is the global leader in agricultural industry and research. We are leaders in seed improvement, pesticides, herbicides, fertilizers, expanding uses for crops, mechanization, the study of soil, and so much more. Iowans truly do feed the world.

And even those of us who do not work directly in agriculture tend to do work that makes farm life possible. We provide insurance or health care or other services to farmers. We educate children in rural areas and keep local businesses open. Everyone in Glidden contributes to the agricultural economy. We are all part of the same mission.

But that mission is not complete. Even though we produce far more food than we need, many people in Carroll County still go hungry. In the Glidden-Ralston school district, 84 children qualify for a free or reduced price lunch (roughly 26% of all the enrolled students). In the Carroll school district, that number is closer to 35%. Poverty in Iowa means that many people who contribute to food production often don't have enough to feed their families.

Additionally, around the world, there are 800 million people who suffer from chronic undernourishment. These people tend to live in developing nations in Southern Asia, Eastern Asia, and Sub-Saharan Africa. Many are farmers themselves: people who work very hard to grow food but live in areas with poor soil or without access to advanced farming practices.

Thankfully, we can do a lot to meet both of these challenges. Our local food pantry, the Community of Concern, helps to ensure that everyone in Carroll County has access to nutritious food. And Meals From the Heartland packages family meals to be sent where they are most needed in the world. In 2016, Meals From the Heartland packaged 18 million meals – not enough to feed the world yet, but they don't work alone. Both of these operations work together to feed people that the normal agricultural economy might otherwise miss.

You can join us in this effort by signing up to go down to Des Moines with us on the morning of Thursday, August 31<sup>st</sup>, for Meals From the Heartland's Annual Hunger Fight. Those of us who are carpooling will leave from the church at approximately 8:00am and package meals at HyVee Hall in Des Moines from 10:00am to noon.

Or, if packaging meals isn't your thing, you can always donate money or food to support our local food pantry. The Community of Concern is our special offering for July and August so all designated gifts will be passed on to them.

Iowans do feed the world, but there's still work to be done.

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## Meet the Members

The spotlight for this month's article shines on Abigail "Abby" Stonner who lives in Carroll, Iowa. Abby was born in Des Moines and lived in Norwalk the first year of her life.

Abby's parents are Dean Stonner and Carol Hawley Stonner who live in Newton, Iowa. Dean Stonner was a corporate attorney for the Maytag Corporation and later Principal Financial. Carol Stonner was educated as an early elementary teacher and taught prior to the birth of her children. Carol took time off to raise her family but when they reached junior high and high school, she re-entered the world of work. She is now employed as the Executive Administrative Assistant at Progress Industries in Newton and Des Moines. This organization oversees and manages residential homes for differently-abled clients who need oversight. It also supervises and places independently-living clients into daily work environment.

Abby has two siblings. Joey Stonner is 27 years old and is a 7th grade History teacher at Miller Middle School in Marshalltown, and is engaged to Katy Jo Madison, who works with Special Needs students at Miller. Erin Stonner lives in Storm Lake, Iowa and is a mental health counselor for Plains Area Mental Health, and is seeing Nanda Gopal, an engineer in Cedar Rapids. The only other member of Abby's family is Giada, a seven year old tortie cat.

Even in grade school Abby loved school and its challenges. She especially liked language arts, reading, history, and science. Later in her schooling she became more interested in math. In high school she excelled at English, Geometry, and Physics. Abby was well rounded as she participated in several extracurricular activities. Throughout her junior and senior high years she participated in chorus, band, jazz band, marching band, drama and played in the orchestra. She graduated from high school in 2006 and college days were a new beginning.

Abby enrolled in the University of Northern Iowa and became a Panther at heart. She majored in English, with a double minor in Creative Writing and Religious Studies. Her religious studies concentrated on Christianity but did cover other world religions. While at UNI Abby worked at the North American Review as a proof reader and participated in the marching band. Abby claims she plays the piano for her enjoyment and sings while driving her car. This demonstrates her joy for music.

Abby graduated from UNI in 2010 and that fall enrolled at Iowa State University where she studied creative writing for three years. While at ISU she was a teaching assistant for Speech Communication 212 for students from all disciplines, including a 7 am summer course for athletes that included running back (and neuroscience student) Jeff Woody .

In 2013 she accepted employment in Des Moines at Wells Fargo bank and worked there for one year. The type of work assigned to her was not a fit so she moved on to Truckers Insurance Company located in West Des Moines. She worked in the underwriting department and enjoyed her work as the company insured over the road truckers. She worked at Truckers for two years before she ran into a detour that changed her life.

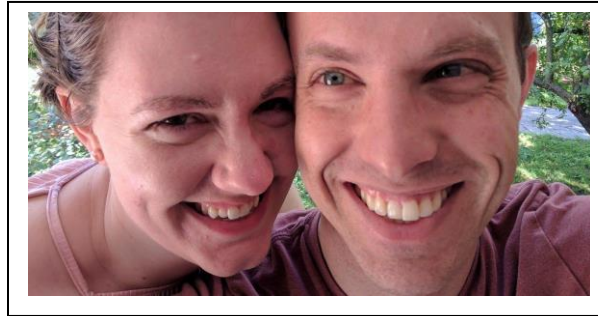

In January of 2017 Abby enrolled at San Jose State University to attain a Masters Degree in Library and Informational Science. She is completing her studies online as a part time student. In addition to her studies, Abby is working part time at JC Penney's and volunteers at the Animal Rescue in Carroll.

In her spare time she likes to write, cook, bake, and spend time on the internet.

Abby's grandparents lived in Florida and she remembers the long trips to visit them. This experience with a great family and working for the public have been unique as she has learned many life experiences from this background.

Abby grew up in the St. Lukes Methodist Church in Newton (where she went to church with Joyce Stonehocker) and fondly recalls work trips with the youth group to Rock Island, Illinois, Dubuque, Iowa and Colorado



Springs, Colorado as the group helped families with remodeling, painting and clean-up projects.
